## A Letter from the President

As the 2008 season comes to end I reflect on how fortunate we are to enjoy the Adirondacks, especially Lake George with its clean fresh water, surrounded by mountains which are especially green this year. Nature has provided a superb setting for us to enjoy our summer experience with family and friends.

Along with all this comes an obligation to preserve for future generations what we have enjoyed. We have found these tasks complicated and numerous over the six years since we formed the Lake Communities of Putnam. We have been successful through the diligent work of our Board both past and present in addressing the needs of our members, with our town, our county, and state. We have supported, lobbied, scrutinized, criticized, organized, and done whatever was necessary to protect and preserve the life style we hold dear.

In the 2007-2008 season the LCP has lobbied for continued deferral of a revaluation until the NYS Legislators can properly address the property tax issue and funding of public education. The Town Board, to their credit and good judgment, has deferred a revaluation again this year.

Recognizing the need for a more responsive enforcement of codes and directives of the Putnam Planning Board, the Town Board hired a code enforcement officer in November 2007. Mr. William Ball is experienced with his duties of building inspections, septic installations and the general needs of enforcement with a common sense approach. The Planning Board approves of his performance to date.

Over the years, Town residents have not had public access to Lake Champlain. The Town Board has been working on a solution with various groups including fishermen, snowmobile club and others. The issue has been complicated and time consuming and crossing over the rail tracks has added to the difficulties. Now, Cummings Town Park is within reach; 2000 feet of water front, a track crossing at a safe location and potential for picnic benches and a boat launch. Funding from a state grant arranged by Supervisor LaPointe and State Senator Little have reduced the required cash input by the town. The LCP has supported this project from the beginning and continues to do so; we see it as present and long-range benefit to the town and its residents.

Sewer Projects, Black Point Road and Royal Anchorage, both under construction and appear to on schedule. The LCP supported the Black Point project, and as of August a former LCP Board member advised that residents are generally happy with the progress to date.

Putnam Planning Board is reviewing the proposed subdivision J Guerin (Gabriel) / Lake George Land Conservancy. The first public hearing was held on August 12, 2008 to a standing-room-only crowd. There were a number of speakers both for and against with the weight in favor of approval. The position of the LCP Board is to have the Planning Board vote based on the facts and in line with the rules and regulations presently governing the operation of this Board. We are watching this closely and will keep you informed via email.

Changes within the Highway Dept came with the passing of Glen Chadwick Deputy Superintendent. Highway Superintendent Gary Smith requested the Town Board to appoint Mr. Gary Treadway as his Deputy Superintendent; this was done at the February meeting of the Town Board. Then in May, Gary Smith resigned his position for personal reasons and the Town Board appointed Gary Treadway acting Superintendent of Highways. Mr. Treadway will fill this position until the November elections at which time a new Superintendent will be elected. To date Highway operations continue without interruptions and the Town Board is satisfied with the performance of the acting Superintendent.

There's no question about it. If you ask the vast majority of Black Point Road residents how the Black Point Road Sewer Project is going, you'll discover that most are pleasantly surprised at just how smoothly the entire project has been moving along. Initially, many residents were dreading the beginning of the actual work, envisioning long delays and horrible road conditions. Yet despite the many days of inclement weather, along with the complicated construction process itself, the project has moved along at incredible speed. Almost all (if not all) of the main sewer lines will be in by the time you read this. In fact most of the laterals, the lines actually going to the homes, are also in place. The next step in the process is to actually install each home's grinder pump and any required lift stations. Following all that, and a test of the system, homeowners should be able to detach from their present septic or pump out and hook up to their installed, onsite grinder pump. This project, long over due, and the result of Herculean efforts by many dedicated people should ensure Lake George's water quality for generations to come. The Town Supervisors, and Town Boards of Putnam and Ticonderoga should be commended for working so hard together to make this project the success it is.

## Property Tax Update—Councilman Gladu Reports

Over the course of the past several years there has been an ever increasing dissatisfaction and outrage with the ever increasing property taxes, which often reach confiscatory levels. I just want to summarize some of the activity which has taken place aimed at addressing this issue.

In September 2004, working with concerned taxpayers in the three counties surrounding Lake George, the Tri-County Committee for Property Tax Reliefs was formed. Steering committee members include: Richard Gladu—Hague, Warren County, John Whiteley—Ticonderoga, Essex County, and Bert Windle—Putnam, Washington County.

By mid April, 2005, the Town of Hague passed Resolution 44 in favor of school funding reform highlighting the gradual transition to full state funding of education to eliminate the irrational reliance on property values, the elimination of unfunded mandates, and the establishment of property tax relief measures such as the circuit breaker for residents tying the property tax to a percentage of a person's income.

In May 2006, at a meeting in Lake George with Senator Little on property tax reform the Tri County Committee suggested the establishment of a Blue Ribbon Commission to identify the drivers of this out of control property tax situation and recommend changes to fix this problem.

As a result of a significant grass roots effort from over 52 statewide tax activist groups, now operating as the *New York State Coalition For Property Tax Reform*, Senator Little introduced such a Bill on May 9, 2007, which passed in the Senate but later died in the Assembly.

Recognizing the significance of this issue, Governor Spitzer established the NYS Commission on Property Tax Relief on January 23, 2008. Chairman Tom Suozzi from Nassau County noted that this bipartisan commission is charged with "examining, investigating and recommending the most effective approach to imposing a limit on local school property tax growth in New York State without adversely impacting the ability of school districts to provide a quality education to all students."

The Commission also is charged with developing a package of reforms to address unfunded mandates and other root causes of high property taxes, as well as developing proposals to make the property tax relief system more fair for middle-class property owners.

The commission has held 8 public meetings statewide, soliciting testimony from many expert witnesses, legislators, public interest groups, tax activists, as well as concerned citizens. These meetings have provided a platform for us to push for the Galef/Little Circuit Breaker Bill—(A1575a/S1053a).

School administrators and school board associations favor a circuit breaker over a property tax cap because with a tax cap—which would limit property tax hikes to a small percentage every year—school districts take huge revenue hits. With a circuit breaker, schools would continue to receive revenue at the same rate, but the money would come from state income taxes rather than local property taxes.

John Whiteley, who has been selected as the spokesperson for the Tri-County Committee, and has been addressing this problem over the past 15 years, has attended all 8 meetings, providing testimony in support of the Circuit Breaker bill. I have had the opportunity of attending and providing testimony at the Commission meetings in Albany, and Syracuse, as well as the staff meetings in Plattsburgh, and Colonie. The circuit breaker concept has received significant support as a meaningful relief measure while real school funding reform gets defined.

The Commission is scheduled to publish its preliminary report on May 22, 2008. We do expect spending caps, mandate relief and the circuit breaker to be key elements for relief to the middle class taxpayers.

Subsequent to that, we will launch a statewide campaign to communicate with and solicit the support of our Legislators in order to get this Bill through this Executive session.

## Property Taxes! By Bert Windle, Chairman Tax & Assessment Committee

Six years ago we couldn't get any one to listen as we called for a halt to property tax increases. Today, everyone in government including the Governor is presenting their ideas on how to reform the scandalous property taxes. Well! Thank you ever so much! What took so long?

The LCP has lobbied and had direct contact with all of following: Putnam Central School, Putnam Town Board, Washington County Supervisors, State Senators, State Assembly, Office of Real Property Services, Tax Committees, Newspapers, Magazines, every taxpayer organization we could find in New York State, and yes! even Governors past and present: Pataki, Spitzer, and Paterson. We have continued to bring this topic to their minds to help them all now understand that the number one issue in New York State is Property Tax Reform.

The LCP's present position is threefold:

- 1) Circuit Breaker Relief as presented in the Senate under the Gallef/Little bill;
- 2) Tax cap not to exceed 4% on property tax increases per year, to control future spending by Government;
- 3) Mandate relief — **no unfunded mandates** passed through to the local property taxpayers.

We are suggesting that this threefold approach be enacted this year and that New York State should provide full funding for all public education implemented over five years, if necessary. We maintain that this must be done to stop the unsustainable property tax burden. We are committed to the above and will continue to send a clear and strong message that we are very serious about property tax relief!

## Thoughts on Voting ...

The main objective of LCP is to increase our political presence in the Town of Putnam. In order to do that we will need the help of our fellow New York neighbors. You can help by transferring your voter registration to Washington County so that you may vote on the upcoming issues of interest to Glenburnie, Gull Bay and Black Point Road. These include the election of school board members, town board members, school budgets and other issues that require approval of registered voters. Our ability to influence the outcome of these elections and budgetary approvals is very important.

Did you know that in the United States, fewer than one-tenth of one percent of qualified Americans voted in each election in which they were eligible to vote during any ten year period in the last half century? Think about these things as we approach the next election and the importance of Just One Vote. Remember that your vote or the vote of someone you influence could be the vote that makes a difference.

## **Gull Bay Dredging Project by Bob Coulter, Chairman Putnam Dredging Project**

On Tuesday June 24<sup>th</sup> the dredging of the inner bay at Gull Bay began. All required permits had been received and posted, excavating equipment moved to the beach, the dredge moved from Harris Bay to Gull Bay and the collection bags that are to receive the dredged material were in place. Everything was in place and the first actual sand and silt was removed. The dredging that was first proposed and recommended in September 2002 was finally under way.

The permit reads, " the applicant, proposes the removal of an estimated 2,764 cubic yards of sediment from the bed of Lake George by means of mechanical and hydraulic dredging to restore safe navigation and unrestricted swimming. Over time, sediment carried by high stream flows and sand washed off the Town Beach area has accumulated in the bay, restricting the recreational usage of waters by Town residents. Best management practices to prevent future sand migration from the beach will be employed."

The area immediately in front of the Town Boat Launch site was the first dredged, then the area to the South of the beach was done. Each area had to be cordoned off with turbidity curtains so as to prevent any silt from moving into areas not being dredged. The turbidity curtain to the south of the beach is to be removed the first week in August or when the sediment suspended within the curtain settles out and the water is restored to the clarity of the water outside the curtain. Our best estimate of the amount of sand and silt removed thru this phase is approximately 260 cubic yards. This is considerably less than the original estimate but seems to have removed enough fill to adequately allow for easier navigation. The hydraulic phase was completed on July 31<sup>st</sup> and the dredge returned to the Harris Bay Yacht Club. Still to be completed in this phase is the opening and removal of the dredged material in the two bags used.

The mechanical phase will focus on mechanically removing the delta built up at the mouth of the stream that is just North of the Town boat launch. This phase should not take very long (hopefully no longer than 10 days). The beach area used in the dredging is then to be restored.

The original estimate of how long the entire project would take was anywhere from three to seven days. They have now been actively dredging for approximately five weeks and still have more to do. The town boat launch has been closed since the end of June however the town beach has been open and fully operational throughout the dredging.

Thanks to everyone who cooperated with the dredging by moving boats around, not putting their boats in early, leaving docks out so the dredge operator could more easily move around and especially the understanding of those who were inconvenienced by not being able to use the Town boat launch site.

The Town of Putnam has been very instrumental in seeing that this project is being completed thru the Lake George Watershed Conference, which financed the dredging at no extra cost to the town.

The long-term result we believe will far outweigh any temporary inconvenience the dredging may have caused individuals.

## Lake George Association—Testing the Waters by Peter Leyh

Some of you know that I am a volunteer water sampler for the Gull Bay area for the Citizens Statewide Lake Assessment Program (CSLAP) for the Lake George Association (LGA). The LGA joins other water testers from the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation, NYS Federation of Lake Associations and the Darrin Fresh Water Institute to monitor changes in our state lakes. 2008 is the LGA's fifth year of participation in this program.

During its existence, CSLAP has been involved with over 200 lakes, ponds and reservoirs throughout New York. Lake George has 9 sampling sites; my location is 100 yards north of Gull Island (outside Gull Bay). The samples drawn from Lake George are sent to a laboratory in Syracuse for analysis. The data collected along with the samples taken measure items such as temperature, transparency, conductivity, pH, color, phosphorus, nitrogen, chlorophyll, and calcium.

Overall testing results do indicate an impact to the lake from recreational usage; more so in the southern portion of Lake George than the northern portion. Highlights from last year's testing show that pH readings have increased slightly in the last few years, with calcium decreasing over same period. Data continues to suggest favorable water quality conditions. Long-term trends cannot be easily evaluated since only four years of data exist, though the slight rise in pH and decrease in calcium require continued watching. Personal observations on the LGA ...

It is amazing to think that the Lake George Association has been in existence since 1885 and is the second oldest environmental non-profit group in the country. They have obviously come a long way and have made a very noticeable contribution to keeping our lake clean and clear.

They seek to find opportunities to finance numerous lake saving projects and to promote solutions to the problems facing the lake's watershed.

Since it makes sense to do it right the first time, LGA staff and volunteers work closely with local politicians, planning boards and developers to identify costly pollution problems and solve them in a projects early planning stage.

Education - Their floating classroom has had thousands of students and adults learn on the lake and in the field about the ecology of the lake and how to keep it clean. Lectures cover a wide spectrum of regional interests while focusing on ecological and historic topics. In addition, the LGA distributes "Our Lake Book" and monthly newsletters to its members cover lake-saving tips, project updates and scientific information.

Conservation - Lake George's future is threatened by land and water use. Much of the danger comes from our own neglect; pollution from sewage and runoff, intrusive development, erosion and invasive species. The LGA is committed to solving these problems by improving and protecting the environment in a way that enhances the economic outlook for the area.

Advocacy - The LGA is a strong advocate for fair, consistent and effective application of conservation laws by all levels of government. They seek to find opportunities to finance numerous lake saving projects and to promote solutions to the problems facing the lake's watershed.

Innovation - Many issues like deltas, eroding beaches, wetland decimation, milfoil beds and visual degradation are expensive to fix after the fact. They utilize innovative technology, such as Geographic Information Systems (GIS), to be the first on the scene with a creative solution.

I encourage all of us to become aware of what we can do individually and as a group to prevent pollutants from entering the lake. We can each help to ensure that "...the most beautiful water I ever saw..." as Thomas Jefferson wrote to his daughter, remains "Queen of American Lakes."

### Treasurer's Report

A cash balance in excess of \$11,000 is presently in the LCP account. This is considered by the Board to be sufficient to fund most situations that may arise, such as litigation or special projects. Annual dues have been established at a modest \$25 for everyone, and will be used to meet operating expenses including the newsletter.

## **Lake George by The Numbers**

- Lake George is 32 miles long.
- There are over 170 islands on the lake and 176 miles of shoreline.
- A drop of water takes 8 years to flow from the south end of the lake to the north end.
- The lake is 196 feet deep at its deepest point, with an average depth of 70 feet.
- The water flows south to north, deopping 226 feet into Lake Champlain by way of the LaChute River.

## **The Lake George Watershed**

- A watershed is an area of land that drains into a waterbody. It includes all surface and groundwater.
- 55% of the lake's water comes from streams, the rest comes from precipitation and groundwater.
- The Lake George watershed is 233 square miles, which is about 5 times as big as the lake's surface.
- There are 141 streams, but just 8 streams make up about two-thirds of the total stream input into the lake.
